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THE PRINCIPAL'S COMMENTS

This year during senior prizegiving, our school band, Decaf, gave a stunning performance of Pink Floyd's Another Brick on the Wall. The famous stanza "We don't need no education", caused me to reflect on the massive changes in New Zealand education that we see when comparing my generation to this. These once anti-authoritarian songs are now classic anthems. If you follow the political commentary around education from the last few years, if you listen to a national media focused on dramas in schools rather than their achievements, if you follow social media platforms that feed off conflict and angst, then you would be forgiven for thinking that the sky is falling on the education sector. Much of that commentary comes from those outside this sector rather than those who operate day-to-day with our young people. That commentary sees crises at every turn. It reflects the same negativity seen in most of the sectors of our society. I do not see that same pessimism and gloom as I walk around the school chatting with our students. That is not what our staff sees as they watch them grow academically, culturally, on the sporting field and as young leaders.

In this report, I want to acknowledge the positive efforts of the people who are the real lifeblood of our school. Our job as a school and my job, is to sift through and sometimes ignore the external education noise and focus on what our students need and what grows our school culture. The key questions schools ask today are the same ones that schools were asking themselves at the timewhen Pink Floyd and Metallica wrote their songs. What do our students need today to be the best version of themselves? What will engage them and allow them to aspire? How do we grow good people right across our school? How do we help our young people get to where they want to be when they leave us? Our school setting has evolved but these same questions remain.

The young people who received awards this year are evidence of this. They represent excellence. Each has invested countless hours of study, sacrificed time, and committed themselves to a standard that our staff and their peers believe should be recognised. They've proven that discipline, curiosity, and a willingness to learn are some of the most valuable assets you can carry with you through life. These awards are more than certificates or trophies—they are recognition of personal growth and potential, going forward.

I want to thank our parents, grandparents and whanau. Success does not happen in isolation. Thank you for encouraging our students to do their homework, taking them to sports games, having high expectations of them and sitting down with them to talk through things when they hit the inevitable roadblocks that happen in the teenage years. I also want to acknowledge our wider community, including, Lions and Rotary Clubs, the Perry Outdoor Education Trust, Federated Farmers, MBS Advisors and the many local businesses who sponsor our awards, adopt our Gateway students and work alongside our teachers. Schools do not operate in isolation in rural communities. Therefore, I also acknowledge our fellow Matamata-Piako Schools. We grow our young people collectively and we all take satisfaction in their achievements no matter what their age.

I sincerely acknowledge the efforts of our staff this year. The curriculum changes with the new NCEA Level One Standards and the new Numeracy and Literacy qualifications have been challenging. I am a huge supporter of NCEA, but the transition process to the new qualification has not been the Ministry of Education's best work. The implementation of all these changes has worked at our school purely because of the effort and energy of our staff. They turn up every day to care for our students and support their colleagues. That is the single most important thing to me.

Lastly, to our Board of Trustees: I often tell them how lucky our students and staff are to have their amazing support. I don't think they always quite believe how much I mean that. They give of their time, come with no agendas and show great common sense when helping to provide strategic direction for our school. Our Presiding member, Ngaire Te Ahu, has consistently shown wisdom and courage in her role and that is not always easy.

I am confident that over the next few years, we will continue to build strong traditions, innovations and new experiences relevant to the ever-changing educational landscape in front of our students. We will continue to ask those key questions of ourselves as a school as we focus on the people of our Kura and the positive power of learning. Finally, I once again acknowledge all of those connected to Morrinsville College working together to make opportunities a reality for our students. It is a shared goal and a collective success for everyone.

In loving memory, we remember Mr Ed Krystman who passed earlier this year, a long-serving teacher, colleague, friend and family man. Rest in peace.

As we come to the close of 2024, the board wants to acknowledge and congratulate all our students and staff for making it through another year of learning highs and lows, grief, challenges, and growth. The board acknowledges the excellent leadership of our principal Mr Scott Jenkins, who continues to excel in his role as the leader of our school alongside our amazing and equally capable senior leadership team who support the needs of our excellent teachers and students. To all our teachers at the coal face inspiring and building the knowledge and future leaders of tomorrow, our school is lucky to have such dedicated, committed and passionate teachers. The school would not function however, if it were not for the efficient and excellent support staff, whether they work in the office or out on the grounds. The board was pleased to celebrate and recognise Mrs Grace Martin, Mrs Jane Thomas, Mr Vance Symon, and Mr Steve Cochran for their long years of service ranging from 34 to 38 years at Morrinsville College.

We are confident that our senior NCEA results will once again be very good, as well as positive progress being made by our teachers with our Literacy and Numeracy targets as part of a continued national strategy, to improve the learning outcomes of our Māori and Pasifika priority learners at all year levels.

The media have reported the Ministry of Education's stalled property projects for schools around the country this year due to the current Government's fiscal policies. This has resulted in funding constraints for education, meaning we can expect delays with our current proposed school building projects.

The Board farewelled Polina Mzhachikh who was an excellent Student Representative on the Board from September 2023 until October 2024 and welcomed Rita Bhandari, our new Student Representative on the Board of Trustees. I want to acknowledge my colleagues on the Board of Trustees for their service, dedication, time, and commitment to leading the strategic direction of our school by giving up so much of their time to attend meetings, events, and functions in the best interests of our students and their whanau.

We introduced the phone mandate which, I am pleased to say, went much better than expected. In general, our students have done a fantastic job of following the rules with the added reinforcement by their parents. Well done parents and caregivers.

The Board acknowledges the continued excellent collaboration between our Kaahui Ako cluster schools across our community, to improve learning in all these schools under the leadership of our own Ngahu Potaka. With the change in Government, there is an indication that Literacy and Numeracy will be a key focus in 2025. However, there will still be a focus on strengthening our cluster schools' culturally responsive teaching.

The board congratulates all the graduating year 13 students and the awards recipients at the senior and junior 2024 prizegiving awards. Continue to strive for the best and keep up the excellent work now and in the future.

We thank our community, local businesses, organisations, and service clubs for all the support Morrinsville College continues to receive. Lastly, we thank our amazing volunteers, coaches, PTA, parents, and caregivers for their support of our school and students. We wish all those staff and students leaving us this year all the best in their employment, tertiary education, and further training, confident that we have played a big part in helping you all become life-long learners. Best wishes for the remainder of 2024 and all the best for the festive season. No reira e te iwi teenaa koutou, teenaa koutou katoa.

TRIBUTE TO MR KRYSTMAN

This year, we were saddened by the sudden loss of a dear friend and colleague. Mr Krystman was hunting with his son over the Easter break when he passed in his sleep. The following are some of our special memories of him:

I had the pleasure of being part of the panel that interviewed Mr Krystman when he applied for a Mathematics teaching position at Morrinsville College. It was about a half-hour interview and he barely sat on his chair for two minutes. He stood up to answer questions, with full detail, demonstrating with animated gesturing. This was an enduring quality; Mr Krystman could be counted on to stand when telling a story and would always include every detail. Sometimes the stories were quite lengthy but always interesting...

Whatever the speed zone, it was 50km/h for Mr Krystman; 100km? 80? No, 50km/h. One staff member said, "If running late, I would take the other route to avoid getting stuck behind him!"

"There is something you are neglecting, and I am sure it's weighing on your conscience. Before I take drastic action and send Bruno and Juno over, you might want to do something about it!"

- Mr Krystman sent this message to a teacher who fled to Australia before paying his social club bill.

One of my favourite things about Ed was the running joke he maintained with his students who guessed his age to be anywhere between 60 and 89! The students loved his collection of ties and still find it hard to believe that Mr Krystman wore Hawaiian shirts and sneakers to teacher-only days!

I somehow ended up being the 'manager' of a football team because the team couldn't play if they didn't have a manager. I had no idea what I was doing. Mr Krystman said, "You just put your name down so the boys can play, and I'll look after the uniforms, and coaches and collect the fees". He did, willingly. He was always interested in how the team played and what they scored.

As a Dean, I had many requests for Mr Krystman. Recently a student requested to be in his class telling me that she realised that while she did not always appreciate him as her teacher, she realised that she learnt the most in his class. Whenever I had to discuss moving a student into his class, his first question was "Do they want to learn?" He never said no. He worked hard to ensure he met their needs. I know so many students passed because of his passion, commitment and endless time and patience.

He would always call me Rachel, not even close to my name and no matter how many times I corrected him he would always say "You just look like a Rachel and suit a Rachel". In the end, it was our little joke for the 7 years.


On a few occasions, Mr Krystman spoke to my senior class when we were studying the film, Schindler's List. He told stories about things that happened to his family when they were still in Poland, before World War II. It was so useful for our students to hear a real story from someone they knew, to help add a real context to what they had seen in the film. It added so much value to what they had learnt about things that happened to strangers, 'back then and far away.'

I got to know Ed well when I started to issue him the Cuisine Magazine. He told me he liked the wine selections featured alongside the complicated recipes. He was an avid reader of the library's hunting books which were always overdue as he tried to fit in reading with his absolute dedication to his teaching.

We are devastated by Mr Krystman's passing. We take comfort in knowing that Ed found his eternal rest in the wild beauty of the Ureweras, a place he was passionate about.

QUEEN'S SERVICE MEDAL

Congratulations to TE AO MARAMA MAAKA, a deserving recipient of the Queen's Service Medal.

On the 1st of February this year we acknowledged our kuia Te Ao Marama Maaka at our powhiri to welcome new staff and all our new students to the school. Te Ao Marama has been involved with our school and many other kura in our area to provide guidance and support for schools around Tikanga and Te Reo Māori. She has acted in several governance roles in our community and profoundly impacted our schools and students for almost four decades. She is a deserving recipient of the QSM and we have been grateful for her dedicated service over a large part of her lifetime.

Te Ao Marama Maaka told the New Zealand Herald "I represent the Māori people and that's what I've done since my children started school. I got involved with the schools they went to and their principals, leading guidance on Māori culture and I kept maintaining that leadership role, especially around my kids so they knew they didn't have to hide their identity.

"I got involved in governance and committee when my first child went to a play centre. I kept joining wherever my children were schooling. I was there for them and I was there for the wider community in that sense."

Te Ao Marama Maaka has dedicated more than 35 years to our school and we deeply appreciate her efforts. Her guidance, support, and leadership in Māori culture have been invaluable.

The event was attended by Captain Anne-Marie Leng who spoke about her four tours of service overseas as a driver and bomb disposal specialist in the British Army. Mr Alan Mitchell from the Morrinsville RSA and Mr Paul Hendra from the RSA Poppy Trust who presented a book to our library, were also present.

MATHEMATICS

In the Mathematics department, 2024 was full of ups and downs.

Implementing the new NCEA Level 1 standards and the new Numeracy CAA has been a big focus for us as a department this year, and it has come with many challenges. We have learned a lot and we have several ideas for developing and improving our learning programmes for next year. A highlight for us was seeing students participate in several maths competitions. As a department we wanted to support the school goal of participation by running our own mathematics competition for students to get involved in. In Term 1 we held our inaugural Morrinsville College Mathematics competition where Year 9, 10 and 11 students competed individually for prizes. We had just over 20 students enter, including a large number of Year 9 students, who were keen to participate and give it a go. The winners were:

Year 9 Lucas Belmar, Year 10 Georgia Mills and Year 11 Rhys Gibberd. Each winner received a \$50 voucher from the Game Centre in Hamilton.

The top students from each year level in our competition went on to form teams and train with Mr Kemp in preparation for the WaiMaths competition; this year hosted by Rototuna High School. Teams from many different schools across the Waikato competed to answer as many questions as possible in 45 minutes. Our Year 9 Team consisted of Lucas Belmar, Adam Robb and Travis Marshall. They placed 9th with 17 points. The Year 10 Team, Santi Bernado and Thomas Bowler, placed 7th with 15 points. Our Year 11 Team, Rhys Gibberd, Jacob Butler and Corin Hansford placed 10th with 16 pts.

Our year 12 and 13 students had the opportunity to participate in the NZAMT Senior Mathematics Competition in Term 3. Twenty students participated. They were given an incredibly challenging set of questions to answer, and Crystal Chooi and Finlay Richardson were our top performers.

It came as a real shock to us all when Mr. Ed Krystman passed away suddenly over Easter weekend. He was cherished by many of his students, he contributed a lot to the department, and he has been sorely missed. I'm proud of our team for how well they all came together in such a difficult time to support one another and take care of the classes that Mr. Krystman taught. His family have generously donated a prize in his honour to be awarded to a Year 9 student showing resilience and effort in Mathematics; a fitting tribute to Mr. Krystman who fully endorsed those values. In Term 3, Mr Ravenesh Nand formally joined the Mathematics department to fill Mr. Krystman's big shoes. He has also taken up the role of teacher in charge of football. His enthusiasm for learning and generous spirit towards the students have been inspiring.

Science | Pūtaiao

We had a fantastic year in Science at Morrinsville College. We are very proud of the achievements, big and small, of all of our learners. We were also lucky enough to take a group of students to the Chemquest Quiz at the University of Waikato where we were wowed by the practical demonstrations and entertained by pop culture questions with a chemistry spin.

SOCIAL SCIENCES

This year has been marked by dynamic learning, field trips, and engaging activities that have broadened our students' horizons.

In Geography and Tourism, students participated in immersive research trips, visiting Raglan, Rotorua, and hiking the stunning Tongariro Crossing. Exploring the impacts of tourism and the development of the environment were focus points. Taking the exhilarating Luge ride in Rotorua was a notable memory for the highlights reel. As one student reflected, "The hands-on learning—especially flying drones to capture aerial shots of the landscape—was incredible."

Social Science students are continually encouraged to think critically about the environment and global issues. The 2024 'Enviro Club' led a successful campaign to implement paper recycling bins in each classroom and promote their use, reminding us of Robert Swan's words: "The greatest threat to the planet is the belief that someone else will save it."

History students deepened their understanding of world events through a visit to the Auckland Museum. A further excursion allowed a fortunate class to hear Minnijean Brown-Trickey, one of the Little Rock Nine, share her powerful story in person. This firsthand account of historical civil rights struggles truly brought history to life.

No matter the subject—Commerce, Classics, Social Studies, Accounting, History, Tourism, Economics, or Geography—students embraced creativity, critical thinking, and real-world applications, reflecting the Social Sciences' mission to foster well-rounded, socially conscious learners. As one student aptly recalled, "The most important thing I learned this year is that we must be builders, not destroyers, and lovers, not haters."

HOME ECONOMICS

Home Economics offers many opportunities, such as the burger and Christmas cake competition in Year 10 where you had to design a Christmas cake that you would bake, decorate, and present to be judged. This was a creative and competitive assessment that I highly enjoyed and looked forward to.

I have received the utmost support from my teachers Miss Snowden and Mrs Gwengo throughout the 4 years which has allowed me to succeed in the learning area. My classmates and I have had access to resources to further our learning which led me to participate in the Waikato Culinary Fair and come out with a placing. There are always new experiences and opportunities that lead you to many career paths and real-world experiences that are extremely valuable.

My goal going into Year 12 (Level 2) was to successfully complete the College Cuisine Assessment. This assessment challenged my culinary skills and time management as my group of five invited 40 guests. We were to prepare and cook a 3-course meal, each course having three meal options. College Cuisine is made up of two internals and requires you to plan, trial, and create a menu based on a theme. While College Cuisine was the most time-consuming and stressful assessment I have completed, it was also a very valuable experience as it gave me the chance to experience what a real-life kitchen would be like and to be a chef. I would strongly encourage every Home Economics student to participate in this assessment.

In Home Economics, you learn practical life skills such as cooking and following safe cooking and cleaning practices, the nutrients and servings a person should have per day to meet their daily needs, and what a healthy diet looks like for different people and develop life-long skills. Food is a subject that is available throughout your 5 years at college and have you the opportunity to join at any level if you're committed to putting the work into the class. ELECTRONICS AND DESIGN

Year 9

Students immersed themselves in hands-on electronics, creating copper tape circuits and assembling Future Kit Sets featuring LED Flashers, Voice-activating LEDs, and Moisture Sensors. They used TinkerCad for virtual circuit modelling and incorporated Redstone circuits in Minecraft Education for their sustainable house designs. Collaboratively, they developed eco-friendly solutions, integrating solar panels, wind turbines, and vegetable gardens. Year 9 students have also created modern sustainable homes on Minecraft Education and SketchUp Pro.

Year 10

Students explored a chosen Design Era (e.g. Bauhaus), identifying two key designers and then analysing their contributions to the field. Inspired by these insights, students incorporated the designer's concepts into their projects, showcasing how they adapted and evolved these ideas. Through modification and refinement, they created final designs that included Minecraft Education architecture, candles, jewellery, business cards (using Canva), fashion items, and more.

Year 11

Students in Level 1 embarked on an exciting project to create a Modern Sustainable House using Minecraft Education. They explored the Modern Design Era and aesthetics. Additionally, they chose two influential modernist designers including Māori designers. Māori shapes, forms, patterns, and colours were used for one of their 3 concepts. Lastly, they embedded sustainable features like solar panels, green rooves, rainwater tanks, triple-glazed windows, wind turbines, biophilic design and more to improve their design work.

Year 12


The Level 2 students delved into the world of Modern Sustainable Museums, focusing on modernism, aesthetics, and sustainability. Students explored the work of two modernist architects and chose two influential ones for their research. Finally, they embedded sustainable features like solar panels, green roofs, rainwater tanks, triple-glazed windows, wind turbines, biomimetics, and biophilic design to improve their design work. They also explored e-waste recycling in New Zealand and globally and wrote critical essays incorporating the Māori world view. They investigated New Zealand's e-waste management and focused on possible strategies to improve e-waste management in New Zealand.

Year 13:

Level 3 students explored Modernism in Architecture and chose two to three famous architects. They analysed their work and considered building materials for sustainable principles like passive solar and biophilic designs. Students designed a High-Tech, modern, sustainable house and considered smart home technology. Additionally, they plan to hold an exhibition of their architectural design work at the Waikato Museum.

PERFORMING ARTS

This play explored the coming-of-age story of a young New Zealand girl growing up during World War II in Dunedin. The students really immersed themselves into the world of the play and the characters and came away with a fantastic season, the first to be held in our new studio. The seniors learned how a show is put together by being part of the development of the show in class, with discussions around budgets, publicity, costumes and set, happening regularly. The Year 11's also looked at Theatre Aotearoa for their assessments this year, performing scenes from several New Zealand plays in class. This focus of Theatre Aotearoa helps students understand their place in their world. The Junior classes have been learning to work together to develop their acting skills and confidence in performance with Mr Kemp and Ms Keenan. They have discovered that learning lines can be tricky! Our juniors are very lucky to have an enthusiastic and innovative teacher in Mr Kemp. Thank you for being a key part of the success of this learning area.

All our classes have the opportunity to create their own scenes, using the drama techniques and elements we learn about in class. The Year 11's learn about how to be part of a theatre crew when the showcase comes around. This is valuable learning, because in order to be a well-rounded performer, you must know what it is like to be a crew member also. Our Arts showcase in Term Three was a chance to show the community just how powerful live drama can be with the seniors presenting scenes from Tennessee Williams "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof". It was fantastic to see our International students joining in the showcase both onstage and as crew. We hope that all our audiences enjoyed our efforts on stage and recognise how powerful the Arts can be for our students and communities.

MUSIC





HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION


A specific focus this year in all Health and Physical Education classes, has been developing student agency. This promotes empowerment and engagement, development of lifelong skills, personalised learning, autonomy and motivation and long-term commitment. Overall, fostering student agency has not only enhanced the educational experience for our students, but has also promoted lifelong health and well-being. Learning experiences this year have allowed students to develop their communication, teamwork, decision making and problem solving skills.

Highlights throughout 2024 have included our Year 9 and Year 10 classes applying personal and social responsibility strategies to plan and apply their own activity sessions, with specific focus on improving their hauora and teamwork. Senior classes applied their learning outside of the classroom. Year 11 Health Studies students developed waka ama skills, applying the te whare tapa wha model. Year 11 Sports Studies students participated in inter-class challenges throughout the year in an Amazing Race challenge, applying strategies to promote kotahitanga, and a Crossfit Challenge, applying Te Ao Māori influences and biophysical skills.

Year 12 Sport Studies students trained towards the Bald Spur run at Mount Te Aroha in Term 2 and then applied leadership strategies in their outdoor camp at Kauaeranga Valley in Term 3. Year 13 Sport Studies students planned and participated in the Timber Trail mountain bike ride in Term

1 and then had the opportunity to train towards and compete in the Tough Guy and Gal Challenge in Term 2.

AGRICULTURAL SCIENCES

This year our Agriculture programme has seen students take part in a variety of hands-on projects and investigations, designed to help provide real-world experience in the Primary Industries.

The Junior Programme: Students are provided with a variety of practical learning experiences on the school farm, from raising chicks, planting and growing various crops, to helping look after the stock. **Year 11:** With the new NCEA standards, the students focused on the life processes of growing tomatoes and raising calves. As part of their practical learning, they gained skills in fencing and growing nursery

Year 12: The students studied animal behavior, reproductive technologies, and investigated how different calf milk powders affect calf growth rates; developing a broad understanding of agricultural practices. They also examined reasons behind land use decisions across New Zealand.

Year 13: Students investigated the attributes of different types of potatoes, and the environmental impacts of farming, particularly the effects on the Waihou River. They explored how agricultural practices could be improved to lessen these impacts.

Outside the Classroom: A group of agriculture students competed in regional agriculture competitions against other secondary schools.

The "Clash of the Colleges" competition, held at Mt Albert Grammar, rewarded them with some excellent results. Charla Silvester, Charlie Scherer, Jakob Byers, and Holly Baker placed 2nd overall. Tyla Gotty, Abbie Cameron, Hunter Johnston, and Jordyn McAra placed 3rd. Hamish Dewhurst, Lachlan Bill and Rebecca Baker placed 5th. Hamish Dewhurst also placed first in the Auckland Region Gumboot Throw.

YEAR 9 CAMP







Crystal is an outstanding scholar who has achieved the following end-of-year results:

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


