FROM THE PRINCIPAL - SCOTT JENKINS



Welcome back to school life to all students, especially those who have newly arrived at Morrinsville College, and welcome too to you, their parents and caregivers.

Currently, our school roll sits at over 800 students and this morning we welcomed in over 170 Year 9 students to their first day of college life. This is the largest roll that we have ever had at our school and our roll has

grown over 150 students in the last two years. This year we have had to turn away any student that is not within our enrolment zone. It is a very nice situation to have so many people wishing to enrol with us but it can lead to growing pains as we negotiate new classrooms with the Ministry of Education and try to find new staff from a very small pool of teachers across the country.

Our staff began the year with a Teacher-Only Day and some fun team-building games to get to know our new staff and catch up after the Christmas break. Pics at the end of this newsletter. Our first term is already full with events and opportunities for our students to take part and connect with the culture of our kura. In two weeks' time our new Year 9 students will head to their camp in Pauanui and tomorrow our Year 13s head to camp for two days as they work with our senior leaders to map out their final year of school.

NCEA Results

Our initial NCEA results from 2024 were superb. Our Year 11 students exceeded expectations. The pattern of their results matched the rest of the country with a significant drop. However, they still managed to retain the 15% above the national average result that their 2023 peers produced which was a very significant achievement. I want to congratulate our Year 11 teachers and Year 11 students who worked together to navigate all of the changes that were thrown at them last year.

Our Year 12 results were the best that our school has ever produced. Their 86% pass-rate was again well above the national average of 72%. At Year 13 our students improved 20% on our own 2023 results with a 72% pass-rate, again well above the national average. Our university entrance results again lifted considerably, and we were 1% below the national average, but well above those schools in our similar socio-economic index grouping. Overall these results highlighted a very successful academic 2024 and I am especially proud of the work of our teachers and students.

Welcome Powhiri

This morning, we welcomed our new Year 9 students and new international students alongside our new staff members. This was



guided by our kaumatua Te Mapi Haimoana and Tauwhi Mark and our kuia Te Ao Marama Maaka and was well-attended by a number of parents and past students. I want to acknowledge Mr Shay Noonan, Principal of Morrinsville School and Mrs Jenny Clark, Principal of Morrinsville Intermediate School, who both spoke with real passion for the students that they were entrusting to us.

Contact Between Home and School

As a contact guide, the following may be helpful:

The best person for you to get in touch with in the first instance is almost certainly your son's/daughter's Learning Coach. Each Learning Coach takes on responsibility for the academic and pastoral needs of each of the 17 or 18 students in their Learning Hub. They help our students to set goals for themselves each year and monitor progress towards these and they track each student's learning and mentor their students in their Hub. They maintain contact with you as parents, especially if there are any issues with your son/daughter.

Each House also has a Kaitiaki leader who plays a very important role as guardian of our school culture, dealing particularly with the pastoral needs and guidance of our students. They are also responsible for leading our staff and students with our Contribute, Listen, Engage, Achieve and Respect (CLEAR) values which we teach to our students to endeavour to produce good learners and citizens. Our Kaitiaki can be contacted by you when there are ongoing issues at school, particularly if there are more serious issues which need to be addressed.

To contact your son's/daughter's Learning Coach, Kaitiaki, Deans, or Guidance Counsellors, please telephone the school Office (8898308) to arrange a suitable time. If there are what you consider to be very serious issues, please make contact with one of the deputy principals.

Always telephone the Office firstly to make an appointment with members of the Senior Leadership Team as we are always very busy and you cannot expect that someone will be available if you turn up without an appointment. We will, however, make every effort to see you the same day if at all possible.

Unless there is an emergency, please do not contact us at home - we appreciate the time that we have with our families.

Attendance

The higher the percentage of attendance in class the better the learning that occurs for all students. Students' attainment of academic, cultural, social goals and their development of sound habits towards future employment are greatly enhanced. Thank you for supporting your child to attend school regularly and on time, making a huge difference to their education.

If possible, please let the school know in advance of any absence. Students late to school for any reason should supply a signed note of explanation from you, rather than phoning and leaving a message. Due to the high number of phone messages that we receive each morning it is difficult to check all messages before students start signing in late.

For any absence, please contact the school on 889 8308, select 1 or **Uniform** use https://morrcoll.bridge.school.nz 'Report Absence' by 9am with a detailed message including your child's full name and reason for absence. For any known periods of leave in term time, please obtain permission by prior application in writing to the principal.

A reminder that the school day starts at 8.45am and all students are expected to be here at that time. We encourage parents to help their children to develop routines to ensure that they are at school on time.

Schoolbridge

All communication, permission and payment can be done electronically. To enable this please ensure to set up our Parent and Student Interface, Schoolbridge. One central location with all your children in one place.

Set Up Schoolbridge: https://morrcoll.bridge.school.nz/ use your own e-mail username and password to log in. Get Our App, easy access from your phone. This can be done once logged in. Please contact the school Office, if you have any problems setting up.

Note: Schoolbridge will be the One Stop Shop for you and any other contacts you named on your enrolment form, to keep up-to-date with your child's daily information, including timetable, attendance, results, reports, goal setting, notices, newsletters, student forms, permission slips, and notifying us of an absence.

Cellphones

In line with our school's cellphone policy, all students must have their phones and ear phones/pods turned off and in their bag from 8.45am to 3.05pm.



If a parent or caregiver wishes to apply for an exemption to this policy, they must contact the Principal's PA Mrs Martin by email grace-martin@morrcoll.school.nz, clearly outlining the reasons for the exemption, and Mrs Martin will pass the request on to the Principal who will make the decision.

Students Requiring Passes to Leave School for Appointments

Students requiring passes to leave school during school hours, for instance to attend a dentist's or doctor's appointment, MUST bring a note to the school Office **BEFORE** school so that passes can then be processed and collected by students at interval.

PERSONAL PRESENTATION

Every student who attends Morrinsville College is an ambassador of our school. All of our students are expected to observe a high standard of presentation, cleanliness and neatness when they are in uniform, in or out of school.

Uniforms must be well-maintained, cleaned regularly and mended when necessary. Frayed or torn clothing is not acceptable. There should be no graffiti or other markings on any item of school uniform. Wearing alternative clothing with our school uniform is not permitted at or to and from school.

Boys must be clean shaven. Cultural and religious consideration will be given to individual students who write to the Board to request permission.

Anything that is not specifically listed below is not permitted. All students, parents and whanau should contact their student's Hub Coach regarding any questions, concerns or challenges regarding the wearing of correct school uniform.

FOOTWEAR (Following two options only)

Black Roman Sandals [to be worn with heel strap up and not to be worn with socks1

Plain Black Leather/Synthetic Leather closed in shoes

Please note that in some subjects and classes students will be required to wear closed in shoes to meet Health and Safety regulations.

ACCESSORIES

Plain Black socks [with no other markings or logos), or Plain black opaque tights

Unisex monogrammed school cap & beanie; alternatively, a plain navy-blue or black cap with no other markings may be worn

REGULATION PHYSICAL EDUCATION UNIFORM

Navy-blue monogrammed PE Shorts [Compulsory] Navy-blue monogrammed PE Polo [Compulsory]

shorts or togs. Rash tops may be worn. NO other T-shirts or clothing cannot be worn at school in place of school uniform. are acceptable for swimming.

JEWELLERY

Students may wear up to 3 plain studs or sleeper earrings in each ear Nose piercing are to be a single stud of less than 3mm in size. No other form of nose piercings, including hoops and septum piercings, are permitted. No other visible body or facial piercings or spacers are allowed.

One necklace can be worn of religious or cultural significance. No other jewellery is permitted apart from wristwatches.

HAIR

Hair must be kept neat and tidy in a simple style. eg natural in colour There should be no large colour streaks or patches, or stark, bright, contrasting colours.

Please note mohawk styles or shaved designs are not permitted. If necessary, hair should be tied back eg food and hard materials technology

MAKEUP

Nails must be short and trimmed; well-applied nail polish is Tuesday 9 December permitted. Heavy makeup is not permitted.

FORMAL OCCASIONS

Our students are sometimes required to wear formal clothing for special occasions.

The school has a small number of blazers, ties, and Year 13 shirts to loan to students if required.

MUFTI DAYS

From time to time the school will hold Mufti Days and Year 13 will be permitted to wear Mufti instead of their school uniform. A neat and tidy standard of dress is still required on Mufti Days.

The following are not permitted on Mufti Days:

- Beach wear
- Skimpy singlets
- Low-cut and revealing clothing
- Bare midriffs or cut-away clothing that reveals underwear
- Clothing depicting offensive language, inappropriate gestures or graphics eg skulls
- Clothing with alcohol advertising or drugs

UNIFORM FOR SPORTS TEAMS & CULTURAL GROUPS

Every school sports team will wear the uniform issued by the Manager/Teacher-in-Charge of each Sport. Sport team uniforms are from Paladin unless stated otherwise.

SCHOOL HOODED SWEATSHIRT

The plain navy-blue monogrammed hoody is reserved for representation for sports and cultural activities as appropriate and For Swimming, appropriate one- or two-piece swimwear, swim for personal use. This or other sports or cultural jackets and hoodies
