I have spoken to both our staff and our students that one of the things that stayed with me the most was watching our staff support our students, and at the same time seeing many



times our students ask our staff how they were doing. This was both touching and a strong symbol of our school culture. I appreciate that it would have been an inconvenience as we postponed Parent Teacher Interviews and also to close the school for the afternoon to allow our staff to attend Ed's funeral in Hamilton. It was great to see not only our current staff but a large number of ex-staff, current and past students at the funeral. Friday's 'Mr Krystman Tie Day' was a great way to celebrate Ed's life and his family visited the school at lunchtime and heard many stories from students and staff about his teaching exploits.

Te Puaawaitanga Leadership Trip

This year we have developed a specific experience to develop some of our student leaders. Our head students, Board Student Representative and our Amokura all headed to Wellington this week

to meet with various political and industry leaders to gain their perspective on leadership. This was done in conjunction with the leaders of Kapiti College who will reciprocate by visiting us in Term 2. Our student leaders visited Te Papa and Parliament Buildings where they were hosted by three of our local MPs, were able to watch question time in the House, visited the old Upper House room and also practiced their media skills in the famous Prime Minister's media room. This has been a great experience for these students and they will be bringing back many ideas to use to build upon our own leadership strategies.



ANZAC Day Commemorations

As they do each year, our head students will be speaking on behalf of the young people of Morrinsville at the 10am ANZAC ceremony at Howie Park on Wednesday 25 April. They will also lay a wreath on behalf of Morrinsville College. They will also present their speeches at our own school ANZAC assembly on the first Wednesday back. At that assembly our deputy head students will read the roll of honour listing all of those past students who were killed during World War II. This year our Librarian, Mrs Angela Peters, has researched some of the details around the young men on this roll of honour. Many served and were buried in places that were spread right across the globe and each has their own unique story. Initiated by our student leaders, today's mufti day allowed each student who donated a gold coin to receive an ANZAC poppy in commemoration of these soldiers and to support our Year 8 Enrolment Evening local RSA.

Cellphones

Many of you will have seen the information that was sent out before Easter around our finalised cellphone policy following the COMING EVENTS Government's mandated regulations. This was also discussed with our students at our last assembly. Many students were today acknowledging their last day with cellphones and did so with a good sense of humour. I would remind those parents of students who wish to apply for an exemption to allow students to use earphones in their classes for medical or learning reasons, that they will need to apply to me in writing and include that evidence in the letter.



Winter Uniform

With winter upon us, it is a good time now during the holidays to check your student's winter uniform. Non-uniform hoodies will not be accepted. The students will initially be asked to remove them and for repeat offenders they will be confiscated to be collected at the end of the day. School jackets, including the new puffer jackets, are available to be purchased at Harry's Surf & Sport. Students are allowed to wear navy blue or black thermal tops only underneath their shirts. Students are able to wear the formal black school trousers only. These can be purchased at Harry's, however we will not accept different trousers such as cargo pants or tracksuit pants. Students are welcome to continue to wear the traditional school shorts as most students do.
